Update from October Board Retreat

On October 11th, our Board and School Improvement Advisory Committee held a joint retreat that was facilitated by Troyce Fisher from School Administrators of Iowa. The planned outcomes for the evening included:

- 1.) Reviewing the district goals in light of the ever pressing challenge to prepare students to be successful 21st century learners and citizens
- 2.) Unpacking the proposed Blueprint from Governor Branstad/Director Jason Glass
- 3.) Bouncing around some ideas for the implications on Lawton-Bronson

We also looked at the research of Michael Fullan, the architect of the turnaround of the New Brunswick School System and arguably the leading researcher on school reform initiatives. According to Fullan, school reform can either be led by “wrong drivers” or “right drivers.”

The model for school reform in Iowa (otherwise known as the Iowa Core) is built on three equal points.....

Rigorous Content

Great Teaching

Engaged Learners

During this retreat, all participants reviewed this triangle and broke into groups to examine what we as a district are doing to support these outcomes. We also reviewed key elements of Fullan’s research on the “right” and “wrong” drivers for school reform:

WRONG DRIVERS

Accountability

Individual Quality

Technology

Fragmentation

RIGHT DRIVERS

Collective Capacity

Group Quality

Pedagogy

“Systemness”

We agreed that the current model of NCLB was weighted heavily on accountability (wrong driver) toward a rather low and insufficient bar (percent of students at the 41st percentile.) We can celebrate our annual accomplishments of meeting AYP goals, but will this be enough to measure our students’ readiness in the future? And soon, will this be enough in how all schools will be measured?

Our focus with Professional Development will be on PEDAGOGY (teaching practices), which is a right driver in our efforts as a school, because we are emphasizing the implementation of the five characteristics of Instruction within the Iowa Core and this supports GREAT TEACHING.

While the Blueprint that has been proposed by Governor Branstad and Education Director Glass is just that.....a blueprint that will go through a legislative vetting process this coming session.....I think there is little doubt that there are changes coming. We want to do our best to respond to those and to do so in a systematic way that allows us to be on the front of the change.....for the benefit of our students and for our district.

Happy Halloween! Can you believe it? Where does the time go? The combines are rolling through the fields and the first quarter of the school year is over! I say it every year and it is worth repeating, where does the time go?!

Things continue to go smoothly at the Bronson Elementary building. The month of October has been filled with activity. Our students participated in Fire Safety week. Students learned what do in the event of a fire and learned many things about fire safety. One thing we always try very hard to stress to students is the importance of an emergency plan at home. We always have drills at school and you should have them at home as well. Here are a couple of questions you need to ask yourself when creating an emergency plan for the home: Are all smoke alarms functioning correctly? When is the last time you tested them? Does your family know what to do if the alarms go off? Have you planned an alternate route in case the primary route is blocked? Do you have a meeting place for your family so that they can all be accounted for? Have you sat down and had a family discussion about things that your kids should not do in the event of a fire? Things like not going back in after a pet or favorite toy? Things like not trying to hide from fire fighters? Preparation is everything in the event of a fire in the home!

Our hallways in Bronson will once again be open for district patrons to walk this winter. Walking hours will be Monday thru Friday from 6:00 – 7:30 AM and again from 5:00 – 6:30 PM. You will need to pick up a pass key in the elementary office. Passkeys are available for a \$5.00 deposit. You will receive your deposit back when you turn in your key. If you have your key from last year it should still work. All walkers must be at least 18 years of age and reside in the Lawton-Bronson Community School District. Once again, the Lawton-Bronson elementary is participating in several programs that help to raise money for our school. Students in Bronson recently completed MAP (Measures of Academic Progress) testing. These are tests that grades 2-6 take on computers in the areas of Math, Language Arts, Reading and Science. We take them at the beginning of the year and at the end of the year. They give us a lot of very useful information such as students' present levels of achievement, how much they learn in a year and if they are forgetting things during the summer. They also play a huge role in helping our teachers to plan for future student success.

First Grade News

The cooler  weather is in the air as well as all of the activities that go with it.

Students in grades kindergarten through first grade had the opportunity to go to Morningside College for the play, The Princess and the Pea, at the end of September. It was a wonderful experience for the students. Some of them had never been to a play before.

In math, the first graders are learning to add with sums to 10. They have used manipulatives to help make counting easier. The students have also been learning some math terms : ten frame, Venn diagram, tally, charts, tables, plus, minus, equals etc. They just took their unit test in math.

Lawton-Bronson Elementary has been learning about fire safety. They had the chance to go to the Bronson Fire Department during Fire Safety Week. They walked to the fire station and learned about the equipment, gear, jobs, how to stay safe in the event of a fire etc. When the students got back to school, they made firemen, fire dogs, and talked about fire safety rules.

The first graders are trying to do some fall writing. They are just learning what a sentence is but are trying their best to write some fun stories. They have learned beginning sounds, medial sounds, and final sounds in phonics. They are sounding out words and then writing what they hear. Sometimes it is challenging to read the stories but please keep encouraging them.

Miss Siepker's class has been reading Flat Stanley . They sent notes to family members and have already received some replies. They are locating where the mail comes from on a map in their classroom.

Parents, please make sure to dress your child/ children for the weather. The kids will be needing to come to school with coats, hats, and gloves.

It is hard to believe but the first graders are half way through their second book in reading. They are becoming more confident readers with every story they read. It has been fun listening to them. They are starting to show expression as they read.

Just a reminder, our Harvest parties are coming up at the end of the month. We are not wearing any costumes for our parties. We will play games and have some yummy treats!

Thanksgiving is creeping up on us. We have been anticipating all “Fall” has to offer and what we are most grateful for. 4th Grade News:

Wow! The school year has flown by and our kids are learning more than ever! WE are so happy to see how the kids are progressing and adjusting to 4th grade. Moving from 3rd to grade to 4th grade is a big leap and they have done a wonderful job adapting to the changes.

In science we have just finished our first unit on plants and animals. The kids learned many things about living things including their needs, environments, adaptations, and much more. We have also learned how to use a method called jigsawing in which the kids actually become the teachers. They really enjoy doing this and have done a fantastic job learning it and applying it. We are now moving into Body Systems in which the kids will learn how their 6 systems function.



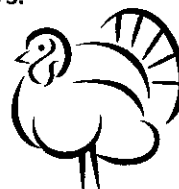
In Social Studies we have started learning about the Northeastern region of the United States. In November we will be learning about Veteran’s Day and U.S. flag etiquette.

In math we have finished up on the addition chapter and have moved on to subtraction. We also continue to take the basic fact timed tests, so please continue to work with your child at home on those skills. Nearly all students have tested out of addition and subtraction and most are in multiplication or division. Please encourage your child to keep working hard on their math skills.

In reading we are working on Theme 2.....Working It Out. This theme focuses on the problem- solving process and communicating with others. It also helps kids build on their own social and problem-solving skills and introduces them to a variety of symbols and sounds that allow people from around the world to communicate.

In English we continue to work on nouns and distinguishing the difference between common and proper nouns. We also continue to work on writing, editing, and revising sentences. Our new Spelling series also provides many activities to work on these skills that help the kids learn to be better spellers.

5th GRADE NEWS

In social studies, we have just finished our Native American reports. Students chose a topic that reflected their interests. Topics included the Eskimos, prehistoric man, buffalo, the Sioux Indians, the mule deer, Indian dressings and much more. Students were *explorers* seeking and classifying information using the internet, books, and outside information. They could construct their reports as they chose. Every student was evaluated on three categories: research, presentation, and a visual. For their first oral reports, the fifth grade did an awesome job. Future topics of research will be done for the Revolutionary War, Lewis and Clark, the Civil War, and Western Settlement. Students learn lifelong lessons of researching and organizing information and public speaking.

Fifth graders are running for president. Fifth grade is having a presidential election. Students will choose a topic of national importance and do research. They will identify problems and derive a best solution. Throughout the year candidates will give speeches, participate in panel discussions, face tough questions and answer sessions, and debate. The process will culminate in a class role play with students writing bills and acting as members of the House or Senate.

6th grade newsletter:

We welcome Dalton Chan to our class.

Science has been very busy for us. We just had a test about weather patterns. We have also made weather stations. They had thermometers, barometers, anemometers, and wind vanes plus whatever else we wanted to add. This was really fun and everyone was very creative. We also did a lab in which we had to track the path of a hurricane. It was very interesting.

We are reading a book right now in reading called A Long Way from Chicago. It is a story that takes place during the Great Depression. Two kids go to visit their grandma and they find our grandma is not "exactly" normal.

We've been learning about scientific notation in math. Scientific notation is used to make numbers easier to read and write. We have also learned more about decimals and the metric system.

In computer skills we are finishing up with a scavenger hunt about the White House. We were given a worksheet and a website to go to, to find the answers. Our goal was to navigate around one website to find the answers. This was fun. We are also continuing with Type to Learn. The higher we go in our lessons the harder it is becoming.

We just took a test on nouns. It included possessives, plurals, and appositives. We are beginning to write a compare and contrast paper. We are learning about organizing and classifying our information so our writing is easier to read.

Ancient Egypt is what we are learning about in social studies. We are learning about different gods, such as Ra, the sun god. We are also studying the different time periods including The Old Kingdom, The Middle Kingdom, and the New Kingdom. We will be studying this for a couple of weeks and at the end we will be doing a project and having a museum to display our work.
