#### From the Desk of Superintendent Jeff Thelander

#### Adjustment to School Lunch Prices Effective January 4, 2012

Effective at the start of second semester on January 4, 2012, Lawton-Bronson School lunch prices will increase a nickel to \$2.30 per lunch in the Jr./Sr. High School and \$2.15 per lunch in the elementary school.

This mid-year change is a response of compliance to section 205 of the Healthy, Hunger-Free Kids Act of 2010 (Public Law 111-296). This provision "requires school food authorities (SFAs) participating in the National School Lunch Program to ensure that schools are providing the same level of support for lunches served to students who are not eligible for free or reduced price lunches (i.e., paid lunches) as they are for lunches served to students eligible for free lunches."

#### Board Retreat Scheduled for Tuesday, October 11th

I'd like to take this opportunity to welcome Molly Holtz and Shelly Junck to the Lawton-Bronson School Board. They join Steve Olson, Machele Dunning, and Amy Denney (who won re-election this month) on our board. I'd also like to recognize and thank Kevin Grieme and Paul Roberts for their faithful and dedicated service to our school board. Kevin served nine years and Paul six and both were part of important initiatives in the district, including the building of our new elementary school. Steve Olson will serve as our board president for the 2011-2012 school year and Amy Denney will serve as vice president.

On Tuesday, October 11<sup>th</sup>, our board will host a retreat at the high school that will be facilitated by Troyce Fisher from School Administrators of Iowa. Our topic for the retreat will be, "How can Lawton-Bronson School better prepare our students for the challenges of the 21<sup>st</sup> century?" The retreat will begin at 5 PM. Members of the Lawton-Bronson School Improvement Advisory Committee will also take part in this important conversation.

#### Weather Related Information for 2011-2012

I want to get early information out to everyone about our notification services this year in the case of late starts, early dismissals, or school cancellations. This year, we will be communicating weather-related information in a number of ways, but for the fastest delivery, I STRONGLY RECOMMEND signing up for each of the two following texting services. Why two? Just in case one is running slowly that day or is having unforeseen technical difficulties. This year, we will provide text alerts through Snow Cap and KTIV. Please review the information below to sign up for each. You can sign up for them any time. Both are free, although for the phone users, standard message and data rates will apply.

#### **KTIV**

To begin using the KTIV service, people must first sign up at <a href="www.ktiv.com/alerts">www.ktiv.com/alerts</a>. This requires a person to fill out a brief form and provide a cell phone number. If anyone has questions about this service, you can go to a new mobile page KTIV has built that answers frequently asked questions about mobile devices and services they provide. That page can be accessed by visiting KTIV.com, and clicking on the mobile tab on the site's navigation bar.

### From the Principal's Pen

September 27, 2011

Greetings from Lawton-Bronson Elementary! The school year is off to a great start here in Bronson. We have a building that is filled with the greatest elementary students and staff in the world! The seats are filled with smiles and the learning that is taking place is simply amazing. We have many new things happening in Bronson this year.

One of the biggest changes has been our new spelling curriculum. We have adopted a curriculum that focuses on teaching kids how to spell instead of what to spell. At its core are the 1,200 most used words in speaking, reading and writing. Lessons apply phonics and writing skills in teaching students to spell. Core words are used in subsequent lessons to insure that students are not allowed to forget them. We will no longer be taking a pretest on Monday and posttest on Friday. We will be assessing spelling not memory. As a word of caution to parents, this is a jump from what we all did as kids. As with anything new, there will be a few bumps in the road to work out, but the final product will benefit our students and make them better spellers!

If you have been past the school recently, you will see that our maintenance staff has installed new equipment on the playground. This equipment makes up a 10 station fitness trail. We were able to purchase and install the equipment through the generosity of the Missouri River Historical Development agency. We were the recipient of a grant from them. The fitness trail includes activities such as sit ups, pull-ups, climbing and other healthy exercises. The students have really been putting it to good use.

Several of our classrooms now have interactive white boards. If you are not familiar with interactive white boards, think of them as a giant touch screen computer. Students can open, close and operate computer programs while standing at the board. That is a far cry from good old chalk and erasers! Teachers now have access to thousands of programs to go along with the lessons that they are teaching. Hopefully by Christmas break we will have interactive white boards in all classrooms grades 3 thru 6!

As a reminder, we will be dismissing school at 1:15 on October 20 for teacher in-service. Parent teacher conferences will be held on October 25 and 27. There will be no school on October 28.

#### Title I Reading Services in Lawton-Bronson Elementary

Lawton –Bronson Community Schools strive to assist all students in becoming proficient, confident, and successful readers. Just as our children do not learn to ride their bike on the same day, or lose their teeth on the same date, it is also true that our Eagles will not all become successful readers at the same time.

Our Eagles have the benefit of receiving reading support and instruction which will strengthen and improve their reading ability. At Lawton-Bronson Elementary, this supplemental reading instruction is given when the students are invited to be in the Title I Reading Program. Numerous assessments, formal evaluations, and observation are used to determine which students would benefit from this reading instruction. In this program, a variety of research based instructional teaching methods are used, as well as activities and assessments that will give them an abundance of opportunities to improve their reading skills.

Lawton-Bronson Elementary is able to provide these services because of funds and support from the Federal government. Students in grades 1 – 5 who are in need of support are given an additional 30 minutes each day of reading instruction with our Title I Reading Instructor, Mrs. Brouwer, or with our Reading Specialist, Ms. Schweitzberger. Small groups and individual instruction are used to give these students the necessary strategies for them to become successful and proficient readers. The Title I Reading Program is committed to continuous reading growth for our students, and it strives to help your children soar, grow, and bloom throughout this school year of 2011 – 2012.

#### Second Grade News

This year we began a whole new way of learning Spelling. In the past we have sent home a weekly spelling list, and have a test on Friday..well, no more!! We are learning conventions of spelling not just memorization of words. This is a new concept and it will take some time to get used to it. We are learning "HOW" to spell words, and the rules that go along with it. So far, we are having a lot of fun with the spelling activities, but we have a lot to learn. How can you as parents help? Help your student study the "Priority words" list for words they don't know, and learn the words they missed on the tests they take. The words we a learning are "no excuses" words. These are words that your student has to know forever!! We believe that this new program will help your students become a lifelong speller, not a lifelong memorizer.

In Social Studies, we have learned all about our bodies and how they change and grow. We will be working on map skills and land in our area and around the world.

Second graders are also learning how living things grow and change in Science. Currently, we are discussing how PEOPLE grow and change. We have enjoyed guessing each other's baby pictures and noticing the many changes that have already occurred and those yet to come!

In Reading, our new theme called "We Belong Together" is about relationships between friends and family members, as well as between people and animals. We know that what's most important is that friends are there for each other.

#### 3<sup>rd</sup> Grade News

The 3<sup>rd</sup> graders are officially back in the swing of things after enjoying a very eventful summer break. We have figured out the new routine and have taken on bigger responsibilities as 3<sup>rd</sup> graders. We completed a unit on plants in science and are now focusing on the needs and traits of 5 different animal species. In social studies, we finished our unit on what communities are, and are comparing and contrasting the urban, suburban, and rural communities.

Our 1<sup>st</sup> chapter in math had us working with place value and money. Not only can we count money, but we are getting better at counting back change. In handwriting, the students reviewed their manuscript, were introduced to the cursive strokes of writing, and are now learning their first lowercase cursive letters. It has been fun to watch them learn to write in a new way.

In reading we have focused on using context clues to help us become better at comprehension, and have practiced cause and effect. in our large reading groups, we enjoyed reading Lions at Lunchtime and Freckle Juice. Our first book report for the year was completed and the apple baskets look great on display in our classroom. We are looking forward to sharing the good books that we have read so far!

#### October is "Falling" Upon 4th Graders!

It is hard to believe that it is already October! Where have the weeks sped by to? The 4th graders in Mrs. Oates's and Mrs. Lefler's classes are busy, busy. They have been doing a lot of review including those addition and subtraction math facts, using money, cursive handwriting, and mastering daily oral language. Most of the kids have done very well remembering their basic math facts through 18. However, some of the students are still struggling to have these memorized. Parents we urge you to use those flashcards and computer games. Repetitive practice will eventually lead to mastery of these very important facts.

In reading, both classes have completed the first theme in the Reading series. Currently Mrs. Oates's class is Reading *Dear Mr. Henshaw*, while Mrs. Lefler's class is reading *Sadako and the Thousand Paper Cranes*. Both classes are utilizing literature circles to read and discuss the books. Comprehension quizzes are also routinely given to check for the student's understanding.

SPELLING.... IT is a little different than before..... This year we have started using the Sitton Spelling Program. We are sure you have noticed the difference in both the way the program is taught, and in how it is tested. The ultimate goal of the program is to build life-long spellers, not just weekly spellers. Though the program is a bit more difficult, the kids are genuinely excited about the lessons. They ENJOY doing spelling! We are all trying to be patient as we learn more about, and use, this exciting teaching tool. We are looking forward to having the best spellers and writers here at L-B.

In Social Studies, the students are learning more about America and her symbols. The kiddos will be finishing this up the first week of October, then moving on to the Northeastern region of the U.S. Students will be expected to learn all of the Northeastern states and their matching capital cities. They will also have to be able to locate each of the states on a U.S. map. Start practicing those states and capitals now. It isn't near so difficult to learn these if you just practice them daily.

For Science, the children are learning about animals and animal adaptations. They have done some interesting in-class experiments and are learning a lot about how animals must adapt to and use their environments.

In English, the students are learning about basic sentence structure, the different types of sentences, and the type of punctuation that each type of sentence requires. They are also learning more about identifying subjects and predicates within sentences.

Lastly, for Math, the kiddos have covered counting money and place value. They are now working on addition of larger groups of numbers. This is where having those basic facts mastered is really a huge benefit. It makes doing those assignments so much easier.

We are so happy to have 43 beautiful 4th graders with us this year. Some of them are new to our district and are making new friends easily. We thank you for giving us the opportunity to help your child mature and grow as a responsible 4th grader. Happy Fall, Y'all!

#### 6th Grade news

It has been a busy first month in 6<sup>th</sup> grade. In reading right now we are reading out of our literature books. We just finished reading *LaBamba*. We had to do a vocabulary sheet with it. In addition to reading we also have a new spelling series. It is interesting, and we are learning a lot.

In math right now we are working on algebraic equations. We have been working with addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division in those equations.

Social Studies has been interesting. We are learning about ancient history. We've been discussing the Phonecians and Lydians. Mrs. Law always makes it fun.

We have been learning so much in science such as all the factors that influence weather. One of the main ones is precipitation. In addition to rain there is also sleet, freezing rain, hall and snow. We learned how all of these types of precipitation are formed. We learned what cloud seeding is too. We are also beginning to work on our weather stations.

In English we have been working on Personal Narratives. We also wrote a "Whatif" poem based on one written by Shel Silverstein. At the beginning of the year we learned about different types of sentences.

We have been working on not looking at our keys in computer skills. Sometimes it is really hard to pass and a level and sometimes it is easy. We take a typing test every Friday.

#### **Vision Screening**

Vision Screening will begin in October and continue into November. I will attempt to screen all students in grades TK-6 in Bronson and grade 8 in Lawton. Referrals from last year will also be screened.

Students in grade 3 will also be screened for color deficiency and near vision as recommended by Iowa Vision Screening Program Guidelines. Elementary students who have difficulty at the first screening are re-screened at a later date to avoid over-referrals. If your child has difficulty with the screening a letter will be mailed to the parent/guardian to have a professional eye exam.

Please notify Mrs. Grigg immediately if you do not want your child to be included in the vision screening. If you would like your child screened and their age group is not being tested or if your child has difficulty seeing at any time later during the school year they can be screened at that time. Please let Mrs. Grigg know. This is a screening and is never presumed to be as accurate as a regular vision exam. This screening is not meant to substitute for professional eye care.

#### Pull for the Ronald McDonald House!

Lawton-Bronson Community Schools will continue to collect recycled beverage tabs all year to help our local Sioux City Ronald McDonald House. The Ronald McDonald House of Siouxland is a "home away from home" for families of children with serious illnesses who are undergoing treatment at nearby medical facilities.

1,200 pull-pop tabs equal a pound and 833 pounds equal a million pull-pop tabs. Our goal is to someday be a member of their "Millionaire Club" that presently has several Siouxland schools as members. We brought in 110 pounds of tabs last year to bring our total to 173 pounds.

#### **Head Lice**

The annual fall head lice checks have been completed in the Bronson Elementary School. All parents need to be checking their child's head at least once a

week. If a child is found with head lice while at school their parent will be notified and given instructions on what to do. A note will be sent home with all other classmates to notify the parents to be checking their child's hair frequently. It can be assumed that there probably are head lice in each building at all times.

Head lice doesn't care if you are clean or dirty, live in a new or old home, if you are 5 or 13 or 48 years of age, or where you shop for clothes. Head lice just like hair and human blood. It can be treated and eliminated with proper instructions and care.

Keeping head lice under control takes cooperation from all parents. If you happen to notice head lice on your child throughout the school year please notify Mrs. Grigg and your call will be kept in confidence.

Encourage your child not to share hats, clothing, brushes, hair items and other articles that come in contact with their hair. Research has proven that using a conditioner after shampooing daily may also help reduce the chance of getting head lice.
